As originally conceived, Van-Go removed cement-coated ashestos shingles, installed cedar siding, and restored and rebuilt portions of the cupola. With work under way, the Neuses also decided to tear away the 1920sera Craftsman-style porch and replace it. An architect suggested the design for the new porch, which has a style attuned to the home's Victorian origin.

Finally, the homeowners wanted a disthis 1870 Italianate house in Tenafly is tinctive, period-style paint scheme. Their Internet search on the phrase "historic makeover. Owners Michael and Karen paint colors' turned up color consultant Rob Schweitzer, who would help the couple select - via e-mail - the five ideal hues for their taste and their home. "We Van-Go General also found at least two other color consultants that way, but Schweitzer's Web site [www.arts-crafts.com/market/robs/historic.html] was by far the most impressive," Karen Neus said. The cost, about \$400, was easy to justify because "we could spend that much money buying the wrong paint," she said.

> There were questions along the way, and Schweitzer was always quick to respond from his office in Ann Arbor, Michigan. "Every time the painters - or us or the contractor - would doubt his choice of detail colors, we'd paint a test area and chuckle, because Schweitzer was always right," Karen Neus said.
